Geographic Origin and Global Connectivity

The primary sources of FDI into Malta continue to be led by European Union member states, with Germany, Italy, and the Netherlands maintaining strong investment footprints. However, 2026 has witnessed an unprecedented increase in capital flows from the **Middle East and North America**, particularly in the energy and aviation sectors. This geographic diversification is a testament to Malta's successful "Global Gateway" strategy, positioning the island as a secure, EU-regulated base for non-European firms seeking a stable entry point into the Single Market. A critical component of Malta's FDI attractiveness in 2026 is its successful navigation of the OECD Pillar Two global minimum tax requirements. By implementing a sophisticated suite of Qualified Refundable Tax Credits (QRTCs) and strategic grants for Research and Development (R&D), Malta has ensured that the effective tax burden for multinational enterprises remains highly competitive. Investors have responded positively to this stability, as evidenced by a **12% year-on-year increase in reinvested earnings** by existing foreign-owned entities.
